I have grown as a person, and I have learned to appreciate things and people in a way that I thought I would never be able to do

This trip has made me more adventurous, bold, outgoing, and less scared.

The most valuable lesson I thin learned is that I want to cherish my time more, do more inspiring things, enjoy nature more, and never stopping pushing myself to be the best version of myself.
